

- 17 organization that supported John Scopes during his trial, originally formed during WWI to protect constitutional rights of activists opposed to the war
- 18 trial that pitted the forces of tradition and religion against science and modernism in 1925
- 20 the first commercial radio station, broadcasting from Pittsburgh in 1920, by 1922 over 500 stations were operating
- 22 women who pushed the boundaries of acceptable behavior, they believed in having a good time
- 24 Secretary of the Interior who was directly involved in the Teapot Dome scandal, he later went to prison
- 27 America after the war pursued a mostly ** policy, avoiding foreign conflicts
- 32 Harding's cabinet included members of the "*** Gang", some of who would bring disgrace to his reputation
- 33 Congress established a ** system to restrict immigration from "undesirable" nations, using census data
- 35 Black nationalist organization established by Marcus Garvey with more than 500,000 members and supporters
- 38 first American writer who won the Nobel Prize in Literature
- 39 radicals opposed to any form of government authority, they were targets of government prosecution after the war
- 42 ** and Vanzetti were two radical Italians accused of murder and robbery, they were executed in 1927 despite massive protests that their trial had been unfair
- 43 **-Briand Pact in 1929 outlawed war, signed by 65 nations, it is a perfect symbol of the optimism of the 20s, it lacked enforcement provisions
- 44 magazine founded in 1923, for millions of Americans it would describe life in America and the world
- 45 ** 66 was one of America's most famous and beloved travel highways, from Chicago to Los Angeles
- 46 well know trial attorney who defended Scopes
- 47 ** was the center of a renaissance of black culture, politics, and arts in the 20s
- 2 terrorist organization that attempted to restore traditional American values and virtues, in reality it engaged in acts of violence or prejudice against Blacks, foreigners, Jews, and Catholics
- 5 **-McCumber Tariff raised tariffs to their highest level ever, 60% in 1922
- 8 a star athlete, attorney, actor, and singer, eventually he would leave the USA because of his frustration with racism, and later would be blacklisted because of his leftist politics
- 10 president during much of the 1920s, he argued the business of America was business
- 13 he published "The New Negro" in 1925, a landmark collection of works by promising young Black writers
- 14 William Jennings Bryan argued in his defense of the Tennessee law that prohibited the teaching of evolution that the language found in the ** should be interpreted literally
- 16 famous blues singer who was the highest paid black artist of her time
- 19 ** Act attempted to enforce the provisions of the 18th Amendment prohibiting the production, distribution, and sale of alcohol

- 21 Secretary of Treasury during the 20s, a very wealthy man himself
- 23 fear of the ** Revolution led to a Red Scare in the US, with the federal government arresting and later deporting alleged subversives after the war
- 24 he termed the 20s as the jazz age and wrote The Great Gatsby, describing the lives of the wealthy as empty
- 25 ** smuggled in alcohol from Canada, Cuba, and the Caribbean, sold it offshore, and bribed policemen and judges to operate freely
- 26 a major ** strike occurred in November 1919, and eventually won the workers a 27% wage increase
- 28 Harding administration scandal that involved oil reserves in Calif and Wyoming, Secretary of Interior Albert Fall would eventually go to prison, ** Dome
- 29 the ** plan allowed many people to purchase consumer goods on credit, with no money down
- 30 the most important Black poet of his time, he described the lives of working class Blacks
- 31 a key technology of the 20s, by the end of the decade 40% of households would own one, it helped give Americans a greater sense of community and unity
- 34 president who was elected in 1920 promising a return to normalcy, his administration is widely considered a failure because of the scandals of his cabinet members, he died in August 1923
- 36 writer who wrote of the shallowness and superficiality of American life, he wrote Main Street and Babbitt
- 37 Attorney General who led raids against suspected radicals and subversives after the war, he appointed J Edgar Hoover to a Justice Dept division that eventually became the FBI
- 40 women's rights activist who fought for the right of women to have access to birth control materials, she would be arrested and jailed for distributing "obscene" materials
- 41 America's best known golfer in the 20s, from Atlanta, he later helped organize the Masters Tournament
